this volume offers an examination of the nation's urban development and reflects the city's pivotal role in the unfolding of american history the second edition has been significantly revised to include more than 75 new content and a greater emphasis on suburbanization and historically marginalized groups chapters included in this edition focus on the lower classes and class relations and conditions the evolution of technology race relations and redevelopment in the postwar era and significant changes in urbanization in order to address the current urban climate the final chapter focuses on violence and the search for security in a post september 11th america

the united states of america are the only remaining superpower in an increasingly confusing world at the start of the twenty first century this volume discusses the stages of the country s rise to the status of world power and analyses the usa s fascinating and complex history on the basis of several fundamental subjects the survey starts with the experiment of establishing a democracy which was initiated through revolution and is unfinished even today the usa s development to become a superpower enjoying world hegemony was equally uneven a rise that has also acquired missionary aspects under the banner of the empire of liberty another focus in the account is the way in which new decidedly american values and a modern consumption oriented technology saturated lifestyle the american way of life emerged from contact in north america between the widest possible variety of cultures and ethnic groups this lifestyle by no means levelled out the existing ethnic and cultural pluralism of american society with topics revolving around politics society business and culture the book reveals the lines of historical development in the usa that have been and continue to be signposts for the modern world

this book demonstrates how representations of the victorian suburb in mid to late nineteenth century british writing occasioned a literary sub genre unique to this period one that attempted to reassure readers that the suburb was a place where outsiders could be controlled and where middle class values could be enforced whelan explores the dissonance created by the differences between the suburban ideal and suburban realities recognizing the persistence of that ideal in the face of abundant evidence that it was hardly ever realized she discusses evidence from primary and secondary sources about perceptions and realities of suburban living showing what it meant to live in a real victorian suburb the book also demonstrates how the suburban ideal with its elements of privacy cleanliness *rus in urbe* and respectability in its relation to culturally embedded ideas about the beautiful and picturesque gained such a strong foothold in the victorian middle class that contemplating its failure caused intense anxiety whelan goes on to trace the ways in which this anxiety is represented in literature

the rise of suburbs and disinvestment from cities have been defining features of life in many countries over the course of the twentieth century in victorian visions of suburban utopia nathaniel walker asks why did we abandon our dense complex urban places and seek to find the best of the city and the country in the flowery suburbs while looking back at the architecture and urban

design of the 1800s offers some answers walker argues that a great missing piece of the story can be found in victorian utopian literature the replacement of cities with high tech suburbs was repeatedly imagined and breathlessly described in the socialist dreams and science fiction fantasies of dozens of british and american authors some of these visionaries such as robert owen edward bulwer lytton edward bellamy william morris ebenezer howard and h g wells are enduringly famous while others were street vendors or amateur chemists who have been all but forgotten together they fashioned strange and beautiful imaginary worlds built of synthetic gemstones lacy metal colonnades and unbreakable glass staffed by robotic servants and teeming with flying carriages as varied as their futuristic visions could be walker reveals how most of them were unified by a single desperate plea for humanity to have a future worth living we must abandon our smoky poor chaotic babylonian cities for a life in shimmering gardens

for generations historians believed that the study of the african american experience centered on the questions about the processes and consequences of enslavement even after this phase passed the modern civil rights movement took center stage and filled hundreds of pages creating a new framework for understanding both the history of the united states and of the world suburban erasure by walter david greason contributes to the most recent developments in historical writing by recovering dozens of previously undiscovered works about the african american experience in new jersey more importantly his interpretation of these documents complicates the traditional understandings about the great migration civil rights activism and the transformation of the united states as a global economic superpower greason details the voices of black men and women whose vision and sacrifices made the dream of dr martin luther king jr possible then in the second half of this study the limitations of this dream of integration become clear as new jersey a state that took the lead in showing american how to overcome the racism of the past fell victim to a recurring pattern of colorblindness that entrenched the legacy of racial inequality in the consumer economy of the late twentieth century suburbanization simultaneously erased the physical architecture of rural segregation in new jersey and ideologically obscured the deepening persistent injustices that became the war on drugs and the prison industrial complex his solution for the twenty first century involves the most fundamental effort to racially integrate state and local government conceived since the reconstruction era suburban erasure is a must read for people concerned with democracy human rights and the future of civil society

the most pressing question facing the small and mid sized cities of america s industrial heartland is how to reinvent themselves once thriving communities in the northeastern and midwestern u s have decayed sharply as the high wage manufacturing jobs that provided the foundation for their prosperity disappeared a few larger cities had the resources to adjust but most smaller places that relied on factory work have struggled to do so unless and until they find new economic roles for themselves the small cities will continue to decline reinventing these smaller cities is a tall order a few might still function as nodes of industrial production but landing a foreign owned auto manufacturer or a green energy plant hardly solves every problem the new jobs will not be unionized and thus will not pay nearly as much as the positions lost the competition among localities for high tech and knowledge economy firms is intense decaying towns with poor schools and few amenities are hardly in a good position to attract the creative class workers they need getting to the point where they can lure such companies will require extensive retooling not just economically but

in terms of their built environment cultural character political economy and demographic mix such changes often run counter to the historical currents that defined these places as factory towns after the factory examines the fate of industrial small cities from a variety of angles it includes essays from a variety of disciplines that consider the sources and character of economic growth in small cities they delve into the history of industrial small cities explore the strategies that some have adopted and propose new tacks for these communities as they struggle to move forward in the twenty first century together they constitute a unique look at an important and understudied dimension of urban studies and globalization

the revised and updated third edition of the making of urban america includes seven new articles and a richly detailed historiographical essay that discusses the vast urban history literature added to the canon since the publication of the second edition the authors extensively revised introductions and the fifteen reprinted articles trace urban development from the preindustrial city to the twentieth century city with emphasis on the social economic political commercial and cultural aspects of urban history these essays illustrate the growth and change that created modern day urban life dynamic topics such as technology immigration and ethnicity suburbanization sunbelt cities urban political history and planning and housing are examined the making of urban america is the only reader available that covers all of u s urban history and that also includes the most recent interpretive scholarship on the subject

urban historians have long portrayed suburbanization as the result of a bourgeois exodus from the city coupled with the introduction of streetcars that enabled the middle class to leave the city for the more sylvan surrounding regions demonstrating that this is only a partial version of urban history manufacturing suburbs reclaims the history of working class suburbs by examining the development of industrial suburbs in the united states and canada between 1850 and 1950 contributors demonstrate that these

suburbs developed in large part because of the location of manufacturing beyond city limits and the subsequent building of housing for the workers who labored within those factories through case studies of industrial suburbanization and industrial suburbs in several metropolitan areas chicago baltimore detroit pittsburgh los angeles san francisco toronto and montreal manufacturing suburbs sheds light on a key phenomenon of metropolitan development before the second world war

the majority of americans live in suburbs and until about a decade or so ago most suburbs had been assumed to be non hispanic white affluent and without problems however recent data have shown that there are changing trends among u s suburbs this book provides timely analyses of current suburban issues by utilizing recently published data from the 2010 census and american community survey to address key themes including suburban poverty racial and ethnic change and suburban decline suburban foreclosures and suburban policy

in suburb in the city david contosta tells the story of how chestnut hill pennsylvania once a small milling and farming town evolved to become both a suburban enclave for wealthy philadelphians and a part of the city itself in 1854 the railroad connected philadelphia and chestnut hill and the village was annexed by the city attuned to the romantic currents of the age the wealthy men and women who moved to chestnut hill believed that the village s semi rural surroundings might uplift them physically spiritually emotionally and morally at the same time they wanted to continue to enjoy the best that the city had to offer while escaping from its more unpleasant aspects dirt crime disease and other shortcomings they thus cultivated a dual identity with both suburb and city ironically this led to a sense of division as prosperous suburbanites held themselves aloof from the resident shopkeepers and domestic servants who provided so many of their creature comforts being a suburb in the city also meant that chestnut hill could not control its political destiny as communities outside the municipal limits could in response residents developed a number of civic organizations that became a sort of quasi government contosta s study of chestnut hill thus illuminates the divided and often ambivalent feelings that americans hold about their great cities he includes anecdotes gleaned from dozens of interviews with men and women of many backgrounds lawyers nuns debutantes grocers craftsmen and former servants who tell of their lives in chestnut hill more than one hundred photographs many never before published further enliven this analysis of suburban america book jacket title summary field provided by blackwell north america inc all rights reserved

how haunted by the idea that their suburban homes were under siege the second generation of suburban residents expanded

spatial control and cultural authority through a strategy of productive victimization the explosive growth of american suburbs following world war ii promised not only a new place to live but a new way of life one away from the crime and crowds of the city yet by the 1970s the expected security of suburban life gave way to a sense of endangerment perceived and sometimes material threats from burglars kidnappers mallrats toxic waste and even the occult challenged assumptions about safe streets pristine parks and the sanctity of the home itself in neighborhood of fear kyle riisman del examines how suburbanites responded to this crisis by attempting to take control of the landscape and reaffirm their cultural authority an increasing sense of criminal and environmental threats riisman del explains coincided with the rise of cable television vc rs dungeons dragons and video games rendering the suburban household susceptible to moral corruption and physical danger terrified in almost equal measure by heavy metal music the love canal disaster and the supposed kidnapping epidemic implied by the abduction of adam walsh residents installed alarm systems patrolled neighborhoods built gated communities cried not in my backyard and set strict boundaries on behavior within their homes riisman del explains how this movement toward self protection reaffirmed the primacy of suburban family values and expanded their parochial power while further marginalizing cities and communities of color a process that facilitated and was facilitated by the politics of the reagan revolution and new right a novel look at how americans imagined traversed and regulated suburban space in the last quarter of the twentieth century neighborhood of fear shows how the preferences of the suburban middle class became central to the cultural values of the nation and fueled the continued growth of suburban political power

how is it that nearly 90 percent of the texan population currently lives in metropolitan regions but many texans still embrace and promote a vision of their state s nineteenth century rural identity this is one of the questions the editors and contributors to lone star suburbs confront one answer they contend may be the long shadow cast by a texas myth that has served the dominant culture while marginalizing those on the fringes another may be the criticism suburbia has endured for undermining the very romantic individuality that the texas myth celebrates from the 1950s to the present cultural critics have derided suburbs as landscapes of sameness and conformity only recently have historians begun to document the multidimensional industrial and ethnic aspects of suburban life as well as the development of multifamily housing services and leisure facilities in lone star suburbs urban historian paul j p sandul texas historian m scott sosebee and ten contributors move the discussion of suburbia well beyond the stereotype of endless blocks of white middle class neighborhoods and fill a gap in our knowledge of the lone star state this collection supports the claim that texas is not only primarily suburban but also the most representative example of this urban form in the united states essays consider transportation infrastructure urban planning and professional sports as they relate to the suburban ideal the

before franklin roosevelt declared december 7 to be a date which will live in infamy before american soldiers landed on d day before the b 17s b 24s and b 29s roared over europe and asia there was willow run located twenty five miles west of detroit the bomber plant at willow run and the community that grew up around it attracted tens of thousands of workers from across the united states during world war ii together they helped build the nation s arsenal of democracy but willow run also became the site of repeated political conflicts over how to build suburbia while mobilizing for total war in planning the home front sarah jo peterson offers readers a portrait of the american people industrialists and labor leaders federal officials and municipal leaders social reformers industrial workers and their families that lays bare the foundations of community the high costs of racism and the tangled process of negotiation between new deal visionaries and wartime planners by tying the history of suburbanization to that of the home front
